Dr. Brower will discuss the migration of the monarch butterfly and growing concern that this incredible migration is becoming an endangered phenomenon. An estimated 200 million monarchs from all of North America, migrate to a handful of sites in the mountains outside Mexico City. High altitude and tropical latitude produce stable temperatures that, with the protective forest cover allow monarchs to survive the winter.

8 - PEANUT HEARTS




