## **Wisconsin Important Bird Areas** (IBA) Program

Yoyi Steele will discuss the IBA program, it's accomplishments, recent activities, and how the public can become involved. Yoyi has been the IBA Coordinator since 2003. She has a Master's in Conservation Biology from UW Madison. Some of her past endeavors include work on the Karner Blue Butterfly Habitat Conservation Plan project for WDNR, fieldwork in western Mexico for her master's research, bird surveys in the Lower Wisconsin River floodplain, work as a nest-searcher for Point Reyes Bird Observatory in California, and fieldwork in east central Arizona for the Mexican Wolf reintroduction project.

## **Raptor Education Group** / **Avian Rehabilitation**

Marge Gibson co-founded Raptor Education Group, Inc (REGI) in 1990. Marge has worked with wildlife for over 30 years. She began her work with raptors as a field biologist. She has worked with many high profile field projects including the California Condor Recovery Team and the Bald Eagle Capture and Health Assessment Program in Valdez. Alaska following the Valdez Oil Spill where she was team captain. In addition, Marge teaches wildlife rehabilitation internationally.

In the beginning, REGI was focused on public education programs and supporting field research on avian species. In part due to the remote northern location of the center in Antigo, WI, it soon became apparent that rehabilitation would be a major part of the work done at the center. While specializing in large raptors and swans, all avian species are accepted for rehabilitation at the center. Since its beginning, thousands of raptors and other avian species have been patients at the wildlife center.

Silent Conversations with Eastern Wood Warblers is an intimate photographic journey into the lives of the thirty-eight species of warblers that migrate through the Americas east of the Great Plains. #### <u> Wednesday Mornings at Windpoint - 7:00 A.M.</u>

Enjoy early winter mornings as we look for waterfowl (including specialties such as Long-tailed Ducks and perhaps a Harlequin Duck that has been seen recently), various gull species (~7 possible), winter sparrows and finches, and more. It's always a surprise at what we might find. Meet at the Windpoint Lighthouse (Racine Co.) on Wednesday mornings — 7:00 A.M.

## Saturday, January 14, 2006 - Bald Eagle Viewing

Each winter in Prairie du Sac and Sauk City, Bald Eagles gather because the strong current below the Prairie du Sac dam keeps the river from freezing, allowing eagles access to their favorite food, fish. The area's bluffs and valleys provide needed shelter from severe weather and roosting for the night. Eagle watching is best during the morning, when the birds are most active fishing and are frequently seen perching in trees along the river. Spotting scopes are available for your use at the Ferry Bluff Eagle Council's Överlook in Prairie du Sac. Enjoy the special activities and educational exhibits at the River Arts Center. Hot food and beverages will be available for sale at the Sauk Prairie High School and VFW Park. ### Racine Christmas Bird Count Results

Thanks to the seven field parties and several feeder watchers that participated on the December 17th Racine CBC. Fifty-three species and 6186 individuals were recorded. A few highlights are in bold below from the reports received so far:

## The Great Backyard Bird Count - February 17 - 20, 2006

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) returns for its ninth season February 17-20, 2006. The National Audubon Society and the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology encourage everyone to COUNT BIRDS WITH A BUDDY! Bird enthusiasts of all ages can share their love of birds with a friend, a child, a scout troop, a class, or a co-worker—opening new eyes to the joy of birding and the fun of creating a unique snapshot of winter bird abundance and distribution across the continent. Every pair of eyes is needed and everybirdy counts, whether in a backyard, on a high-rise balcony, in a park, or on any of the 730 million acres of public lands.

In 2005, participants sent in more than 52,000 checklists, with a record-breaking 613 species and more than 6 million birds counted. These millions of sightings generate what would be impossible otherwise - continent-wide information about where the birds are and how their numbers compare with those of previous years. Anyone with Internet access can see the results in maps and charts as the sightings p our in.

For nearly a decade, the GBBC has kept tabs on the ever-changing patterns of birds in winter. How far north will American Robins be reported this year? Will Sandhill Cranes migrate early or late? Introduced Eurasian Collared Doves have been turning up in new states—where will they be this year? Native Red-bellied Woodpeckers have been spreading to the northeast—will this trend continue? Scientists also want more information on declining species, such as Rusty Blackbirds and Painted Buntings. While these species are suffering from the continued destruction of their preferred habitats, other factors, such as mercury accumulation in Rusty Blackbirds, and removal of Painted Buntings for the illegal cage bird industry, may make a bad situation worse.

This project has become a major source of scientific information about North American bird populations," said Dr. John Fitzpatrick, director of the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. "It is a classic example of the vital role citizens and the Internet now play in understanding our planet." Everyone can participate, from beginning bird watchers to seasoned experts at no cost. During the count, bird watchers can tally up birds for as little as 15 minutes, or for as long as they like, keeping track of the highest number of each bird species they see together at one time. People are encouraged to report birds from public lands and local parks, as well as from their own backyards. Participants enter their numbers online at www.birdsource.org/gbbc and can explore sightings maps, lists, and charts as the count progresses.
