Raptor Education Group / Avian Rehabilitation Thursday, March 2, 2006 at 7:00 P.M. River Bend Nature Center 3600 N. Green Bay Rd. - Racine

Marge Gibson co-founded Raptor Education Group, Inc (REGI) in 1990. Marge has worked with wildlife for over 30 years. She began her work with raptors as a field biologist. She has worked with many high profile field projects including the California Condor Recovery Team and the Bald Eagle Capture and Health Assessment Program in Valdez, Alaska following the Valdez Oil Spill where she was team captain. In addition, Marge teaches wildlife rehabilitation internationally.

In the beginning, REGI was focused on public education programs and supporting field research on avian species. In part due to the remote northern location of the center in Antigo, WI, it soon became apparent that rehabilitation would be a major part of the work done at the center. While specializing in large raptors and swans, all avian species are accepted for rehabilitation at the center. Since its beginning, thousands of raptors and other avian species have been patients at the wildlife center.

Field Trips

Weekday Mornings at Windpoint - 7:00 A.M.

Through the end of March, we'll meet WEDNESDAY mornings and enjoy late winter mornings looking for waterfowl (including specialties such as Long-tailed Ducks and perhaps a Harlequin Duck), various gull species (~7 possible), winter sparrows, finches, and more. It's always a surprise at what we might find. Meet at the Windpoint Lighthouse (Racine Co.) on Wednesday mornings - 7:00 A.M.

Starting in April, we'll begin meeting on THURSDAY mornings and change our starting location to Myers Park (southeast of Racine Gateway Tech College) to take advantage of spring migrants found along the shoreline and base of hillside throughout April and May. A few of us may arrive earlier at 6:30 to begin.

<u>Evening Wetland and Waterfowl Bird Walk</u> <u>at Nicholson Wildlife Refuge</u>

Tuesday, March 28 and Wednesday, April 5, 2006 - 5:30 P.M.

Nicholson Wildlife Refuge, in a normal wet spring, is a good location to view migrant waterfowl during March and April. Highlights seen in the past have been a flock of Tundra Swans, Ring-necked Ducks, Northern Shoveler, Pied-billed Grebes, Green and Blue-winged Teal, Wood Duck, Northern Pintail, Redhead Duck, Hooded and Common Mergansers, Ruddy Ducks, Sora, Virginia Rail, Great Egret, Yellow-headed Blackbird and much more.

NWR is located on 5 Mile Road, between County H and the Nicholson Road - Racine Co. / Caledonia Township. There is a small gravel parking lot on the south side of the road. Meet at the gravel lot at 5:15 PM or meet us down the trail to the south where we'll be viewing the pond from. Contact Eric Howe for more information.

Listen to the peents and see the aerial dances of the twittering "Tmberdoodle". With any luck , we may see the ground chattering confrontations of rival male American Woodcocks. Meet by 6:30 P.M. at Picnic Area #2 (near the yellow gate).

Should bad weather occur on the 12th, we have planned a rain date of Wednesday, April 19th . Some of the trails may be wet from recent rainfall, so bring rain boots if you have them. Cliffside Park is located on the lakefront in northeast Racine Co., between the 6 and 7 Mile Road, off of Michna Road.

<u>Evening Warbler Walks at Colonial Park</u> <u>Wednesday evenings April 26 - May 31 - 5:30 P.M.</u>

Our annual evening hikes at Colonial Park are a great opportunity to relax after a long day and relish the progression of new spring migrants. From the early Yellow-rumped and Palm Warblers to the later coming Canada Warbler and perhaps a Connecticut Warbler, they'll be plenty of eyes to help point out all the activity.

Coffee that is slow to grow and slow to ripen, as in shade grown coffee, better converts its starches to sugars and is richer in flavor. Other Upcoming Field Trips

March 3-5 (Friday to Sunday) - North Woods Winter Birds (RBC)

Riveredge Bird Club will rendezvous at 7 a.m. Friday at the intersection of County H and Highway 173 in Mather (C/D6, Page 51) in DeLorme). Four-wheel drive, good boots, warm clothes and a bag lunch are good ideas. The first day will again take the group to the Bear Bluff Road cranberry bogs in Jackson-Juneau-Wood counties, where they have seen golden eagles, sharp-tailed grouse, rough-legged hawks, wild turkeys, trumpeter swans, etc. They will move on to the Buena Vista Grasslands in search of prairie chickens and short-eared owls, redpolls, etc. They then will work their way north through the bogs around Tomahawk and overnight again at the Oneida Village Inn in Three Lakes. They have reserved a block of rooms there for Friday and Saturday nights. Regular rates are \$47.50 a night for a single and \$58.50 for a room with two double beds. Call (715) 546-3373 and mention the Riveredge Bird Club to secure one in that block and receive a 10% discount. Of course, you are free to stay elsewhere, but the motel will serve as their headquarters and they will leave from there predawn Saturday in search of sprouse grouse, then work their way through the Nicolet National Forest for black-backed woodpecker, boreal chickadee, pine and evening grosbeak, both redpolls, both crossbills, gray jay, raven, Bohemian waxwing, northern goshawk, northern shrike, purple finch, etc. Sunday morning they will make our plans based on our success the previous day and then bird their way home. Sunday, March 12 - Milwaukee - Lakefront Birding (WSO)
