For the past two years, Wisconsin has led the nation for numbers of bluebirds produced in artificial nest boxes from those monitoring boxes on a weekly basis. For these reasons among others, the Bluebird Restoration Association of WI (BRAW) has been given the prestigious "**2008 Joseph Hickey Award for Excellence in Bird Conservation**" from Madison Audubon Society. I will be accepting this award on behalf of the BRAW Board and membership on March 18.

Hoy Audubon has been a vital part of this excellence in bluebird conservation demonstrated and now being recognized by BRAW. In the two years of monitoring, great strides have been made in bluebird production and participation by Hoy Audubon members and friends. But I submit Hoy Audubon has only scratched the surface.

In the 2008 season, Hoy Audubon trails were hit hard by bad weather, as were 2/3 of all trails in Wisconsin. This led to a super production of Tree Swallows at the expense of bluebird production. My goal for Hoy Audubon is to develop a "true bluebird" trail (more bluebirds produced than Tree Swallows). That is an exceptional challenge in SE Wisconsin because there is a high population of Tree Swallows and low population of bluebirds.

But, by selecting ideal habitat for bluebirds, I contend that this is possible. To this end, last fall Hoy Audubon members put nest boxes up on three different golf courses (two new), a horse farm and at UW-Parkside and moved low producing boxes on two memorial parks. This was a heroic effort on the part of Hoy Audubon members and should lead to a significant increase in bluebirds produced for the 2009 season (weather permitting).

My talk for Hoy Audubon bluebirders will cover what has happened historically with Wisconsin bluebirding and where I hope to see it go in the future. We will discuss good monitoring techniques, how to improve the collection of data, cooperation with the monitoring/data coordinator, Helen Pugh, and I will answer any questions that you might have about sound management techniques.

Be there for a lively discussion about the "blues brothers and sisters".

<u>Thursday, March 5, 2009</u> Root-Pike WIN and the Rain Garden Initiative YMCA - 725 Lake Avenue - The Buhler Room (2nd Floor) 7:00 P.M. - Program

Susan Greenfield, is the executive director of the Root-Pike Watershed Initiative Network, based in Racine, whose mission is to protect, restore and sustain the ecosystem in the Root River and Pike River watersheds through the funding and facilitation of a regional network of locally initiated projects. Since joining Root-Pike WIN, Susan has led the implementation of a new Rain Garden Initiative that funded the installation of 35 rain gardens in Racine, Kenosha and Milwaukee in 2008 and brought together 17 southeastern Wisconsin towns, villages, cities and counties for a new public outreach program focused on storm water management and water quality. In 2008 the John Muir Chapter of the Sierra Club-Wisconsin recognized Root-Pike WIN with a *Good Citizen Award* for its rain garden program.

This year, Root-Pike WIN will be offering four free rain garden workshops in Racine, Kenosha and Milwaukee counties, with dates announced soon. Last year, Root-Pike WIN funded 35 rain gardens. They fund 100% of the cost of native plants for the public demonstration gardens, 50% of the cost for homeowner rain gardens, and provide free mulch. deadline for new grant applications for the Rain Garden Initiative is May 8, 2009.

Susan will also talk about the Watershed-based Grant Program, which awards grants of \$500-\$10,000 per grant twice a year to nonprofit organizations for projects that meet their mission. In 2008, Root-Pike WIN awarded a grant to Hoy Audubon and Pringle Nature Center for an ephemeral pond study. Pringle was also awarded a rain garden grant.

Our guest speaker, Jeff Bahls, was a member of 2007 Ivory Billed Woodpecker Search Team in Arkansas. Jeff will give a first hand account about his time spent in Arkansas in February 2007 as part of the Cornell University Lab Of Ornithology search for the woodpecker.

Jeff is a life long resident of Dodge County, Wisconsin. He has been an avid waterfowler for the past 35 years and is a member of the WSO, Ducks Unlimited, and is on the board of directors of the Wood Duck Society. Jeff has volunteered for various bird monitoring project including CBC's, Monitoring Wood Duck and Tree Swallow/Bluebird nest boxes, and has helped with baseline bird survey of Plum Island, part of Green Bay NWR. He volunteers for Horicon NWR and Horicon Marsh State Wildlife Area. Jeff is a 13 member of Horicon Marsh Bird Club and currently is the HMBC President.

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February 13-16, 2009 - The 12th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count - Count for Fun, Count for the Future

A joint project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society, this free event is an opportunity for families, students, and people of all ages to discover the wonders of nature in backyards, schoolyards, local parks, and, at the same time, make an important contribution to conservation. Participants count birds and report their sightings online at www.birdcount.org.

Ånyone can take part, from novice bird watchers to experts, by counting birds for as little as 15 minutes (or as long as they wish) on one or more days of the event and reporting their sightings online at www.birdcount.org. Participants can also explore what birds others are finding in their backyards - whether in their own neighborhood or thousands of miles away. Additional online resources include tips to help identify birds, a photo gallery, and special materials for educators.

The data that you collect as a "citizen scientist" helps researchers understand bird population trends, information that is critical for effective conservation. Their efforts enable everyone to see what would otherwise be impossible: a comprehensive picture of where birds are in late winter and how their numbers and distribution compare with previous years. In 2008, participants submitted more than 85,000 checklists.

Passing of a Friend

Results of the Racine Christmas Bird Count - December 14, 2008

Seven field parties and several feeder watchers contributed to the results of the Racine CBC. Despite a breezy day, the rain did hold off for the count day. A total of 48 species were tallied for the day and an additional seven species were observed during the count week (CW), but not on the count day.
