



WBBA II: Hoy Sponsors European Goldfinch

To help raise funds for the Wisconsin Breeding Birds Atlas II, the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology (WSO) has created a sponsorship program for each species that will be represented in the Atlas. Most birds have already been sponsored, but some still need funding.

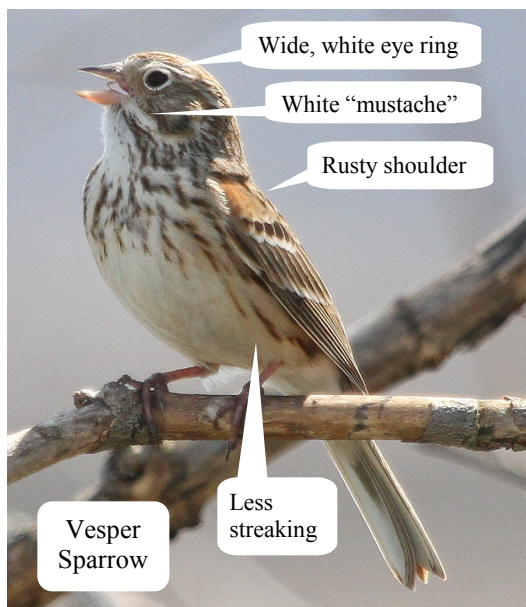
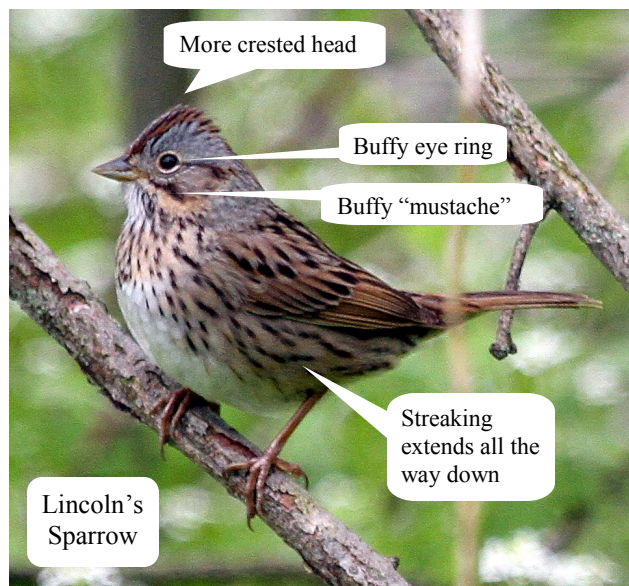
Vesper Sparrow vs. Lincoln's Sparrow

Now that fall migration is just around the corner, some of the sparrows that passed through during the spring migration are headed back south for the winter. Two of those sparrows, namely Vesper Sparrow and Lincoln's Sparrow, are quite similar in appearance. Since the Vesper breeds in our area, there may be more of them to see now and compare to the Lincoln's Sparrow, which breeds farther north. Here are a few tips that hopefully will help with identification.

The Vesper Sparrow is a bit larger and is a colder, grayish brown color on the back and wings versus the Lincoln's, which is a more rusty brown with finer streaking on the back and quite rusty wings. The breast and belly of a Vesper are often quite white with coarse streaking on the breast, which lessens down the sides and along the flank, while the Lincoln's breast and

belly are a duller white with finer streaking which usually goes all the way down the side and flank to the undertail coverts. Lincoln's Sparrow also has a buffy color on the upper breast and down the side and flank to the undertail coverts.

One quite noticeable field mark is the wide, bright white eye ring on the Vesper, while the Lincoln's eye ring is not quite as conspicuous and is buffy instead of white. The Vesper Sparrow is quite brown around the face area and head, which is rounded, but it has a bold white mustache stripe and black malar stripe, while the Lincoln's has an almost crested head with a buffy malar stripe, a brownish mustache stripe, and a conspicuous gray supercilium, nape, and sides of its neck.



The Vesper Sparrow's bill is quite large and pale compared to the grayish, smaller bill of the Lincoln's Sparrow.

One field mark that is a clincher, but not always seen, is the rusty shoulder patch on the Vesper, which shows well in the photo at left. The Vesper Sparrow also has two white wing bars which the Lincoln's does not show.

Hopefully these tips will help with identification, even when a direct comparison in the field is not always possible.

Monitoring Monarchs

Other winged creatures are headed south this fall: the year's final generation of Monarch Butterflies. They will winter in Mexico before journeying back north in spring. It may be their children, grandchildren, or great-grandchildren who will arrive in Racine and Kenosha to continue the cycle.

He collected eggs and caterpillars from the milkweed in our yard and put them in containers in the kitchen, refreshing the leaves each day. As each caterpillar reached its final stage, it climbed the wall to dangle from the lid of the container and form a chrysalis. Then...we waited.

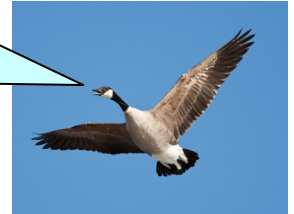


A little less than two weeks later, butterflies began to emerge. Every evening Eric would gently retrieve the day's butterflies and carefully affix a tag to each before releasing it outside. Now it's a new round of waiting, to see if any of our tagged butterflies are found in the future. Good luck, small friends!

Updates to Hoy By-laws

Hoy recently voted on two changes to our by-laws; these changes passed, so the by-laws have been updated accordingly. Honk!



Update 1: Under ARTICLE V-Board of Directors, the following Section has been added:

Section 9 Action by email

Directors may vote by email on issues that require action or that are permitted by the articles of incorporation, by-laws, or any provision of law. This does not allow a director who is absent from a meeting to cast a vote by email.

- An email shall be sent to all directors to explain the issue that requires action.
- Discussion-by email, phone, or other means-of the issue is encouraged. No sooner than 24 hours after the email was sent, a director may make a motion regarding the issue.
- A second to the motion must be made within 48 hours, otherwise the motion dies. After a second is made, directors can vote by email and will include their first and last names in the email. These votes will be considered as valid as votes cast at a meeting. Votes must be received within 72 hours of the second.
- The motion passes if a majority of the total number of directors vote yes and/or support the motion. Otherwise the motion fails.
- The motion, if passed, becomes effective immediately.
- Results of the email vote will be placed in the minutes and be as valid as a vote taken at a meeting.

Update 2: Under ARTICLE XIII-AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS, the section now states:

These by-laws may be amended by the following procedure.

- A majority of directors shall agree on the proposed by-law change.
- Members will be notified in print and at a meeting prior to the meeting which will hold the vote on the proposed by-laws. Members will also be given the date of the vote on the proposed by-law change at a prior meeting and in print.
- New by-laws will be adopted if the majority of the members at the regular meeting vote in favor of the proposed by-law change.

Advice for Fall and Winter Birding

What to Wear: Weather can be unpredictable, so warm layers are advised. Comfortable, waterproof footwear is a must, as are a warm coat, hat, and gloves. Hand warmers are highly recommended.

Finding Your Field Trip: Visit Hoy's website for driving directions and maps (when available).

Watch the Weather: Heavy snow, icy roadways, poor visibility, or other potentially hazardous conditions may cause a field trip to be cancelled. We post cancellations on Hoy's website and the Hoy Facebook page/group whenever it is possible to do so ahead of time. **If you are unsure whether a field trip will take place, please use good judgment when deciding whether to attend.**
