Christmas Bird Count Results

Several Hoy members participated in this year's Racine, Kenosha, and Burlington Christmas Bird Counts as field parties or feeder watchers. Results of the three counts can be found at: <u>www.hoyaudubon.org/cbc/</u>. Here are some of the highlights:

All three counts reported Great-horned and Eastern Screech Owls, Song Sparrows, and Common Mergansers.

Racine Count: 53 species (9 field parties)

Duck numbers were lower than in years past, perhaps due to warmer-than-usual weather leading into winter. Mallards were the most plentiful ducks at 575 (though at a 19-year low), with Red-breasted Mergansers a distant second at 235 (7-year low). A lone Green-winged Teal was found at Colonial Park (last reported in 1975). American Black Ducks were at a 17- year low with only 7 found.




Some good birds were located on land: Winter Wrens were a first for the Racine count; three were found by two field teams. Golden-crowned Kinglets (12) were an all time high for a Racine CBC. Wind Point hosted a Palm Warbler and an Eastern Meadowlark. The Palm was a first for the Racine CBC and the fifth December record for the state.

A few birds only appeared during the count week: Cackling Goose, Eastern Bluebird, American Coot, and Great Blackbacked Gull.

Kenosha Count: 43 species (5 field parties)

Waterfowl numbers were fairly low here too, but notable birds were two White-winged Scoters, a Long-tailed Duck, and a Red-throated Loon. Kenosha had a nice assortment of gulls: 1,486 Herring, 261 Ring-billed, two Iceland (Thayer's), two Lesser Black-backed, two Glaucous, and one Great Black-backed. Uncommon land birds included two Brown Creepers, two Golden-crowned Kinglets, and one late season Ruby-crowned Kinglet.



Burlington Count: 48 species (6 field parties)

This CBC area includes a variety of habitats. Woodlands and agricultural areas hosted 83 Blue Jays and 39 Wild Turkeys. Open field/grasslands yielded one Northern Shrike, one Northern Harrier, two Ring-necked Pheasants, five American Kestrels, 85 American Tree Sparrows, and six Horned Larks. Lakes, rivers and spring fed creeks turned up two Trumpeter Swans, four Belted Kingfishers, 24 American Robins, and a Winter Wren. This CBC contained the only Purple Finch seen in Kenosha and Racine counties for the entire month of December, their numbers being down overall this winter as were other finch species in general.

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American Woodcock vs. Wilson's Snipe

As spring approaches many birders' attention turns to shorebirds as the wetlands become open and ice free. American Woodcock and Wilson's Snipe are two shorebirds that arrive quite early in spring, are shaped quite similarly, often live in adjacent damp areas, and can be quite hard to tell apart in flight. If you get a good look at them on the ground separating can be done quite regularly. Here are some hints to be better able to tell them apart.

Both the snipe and woodcock are between 10 and 11 inches in length with long pointed bills used for probing soft mud in search of worms and other food.

The woodcock is more lightly colored than the snipe with gray sides of the neck, a brownish back with light edges on the feathers, and a pale buffy-orange breast and belly. The crown is dark brown with some light lines going across. The eye is large and dark on a buffy face, on the side of the head. The bill is long and quite pale in color.



On the other hand the snipe is darker in color with bold cream-colored stripes on a dark back. The head is striped as well with creamy white and black stripes. The breast and sides are heavily barred with the bars becoming darker towards the tail. The eye is quite a bit smaller than the woodcock's and not nearly as visible. The bill is also long, but darker in color.



Habitat could also be a clue as the woodcock prefers damp brushy areas while the snipe is more likely to be seen among tall grass in a marshy area or in grasses and weeds along the edges of muddy, flooded fields.

If you happen to catch a woodcock in its mating display, it makes a twittering sound as it takes off and while making sharp turns in flight. It also makes a distinctive "peent" call when displaying on the ground. The snipe in courtship display makes a "winnowing" sound with its outer tail feathers while in flight. Often times the snipe is so high you can't see it, but the winnowing sound is very distinctive.

Be on the lookout for these two stocky shorebirds and hopefully these tips will make identification easier.
